The Village has to complete a housing needs assessment by April 2022. The bulk of the data collection forming the basis of the assessment comes from the Canadian Census (see attached guide). The last census was undertaken in 2016 and the next will occur in 2021.

It is questionable how useful a current needs report would be, when based on 2016 data. It may make more sense to prepare our first report based on the 2021 census. We will have to prepare one every five years after that (which would then be in sync with each subsequent census).

Mayor and Council Quarterly Report - Radium Hot Springs Second Quarter - 2019/2020

General Remarks Regarding the Second Quarter

I'm happy to report we made it through this summer relatively unscathed. Our Detachment experienced the regular increase in call volume that we've come to expect during the summer season. We were relieved there were no major wild fires in the Province that would require us to send resources out of the area.

Detachment Personnel Status

Our Detachment remains at full strength.

- 1 Sergeant (Detachment Commander)
- 2 Corporals (Supervisors)
- 8 Constables (Provincially funded)
- 3 Administrative Staff
- 1 Reserve Constable
- 1 Victim Services Worker

Our two newest members are meeting or exceeding all expectations. Both members will continue to work on the same shift pattern as their trainer until they complete their recruit field training which is approximately six months in duration. Cst. Kish is expected to complete his training in December and Cst. Anderson is expected to complete his training in February.

Our Detachment is enjoying have one additional member on staff until Cst. Chris Joy relocates to his new posting.

East Kootenay Traffic Services have identified Cst. Vince Bixby as their newest member to be stationed at the Columbia Valley Detachment. Cst. Bixby will be replacing Cst. Michelle Joy who has not yet departed.

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Calls for Service

The total number of calls for service throughout the Columbia Valley Detachment area for the second quarter (July - September) was 1076. During the same quarter in 2018 our calls for service were 1102 and in 2017 we received 1066 calls.

The specific calls for service for Radium Hot Springs were as follows:

Calls within Radium Hot Springs accounted for approximately 8% of our calls for service.

Detachment Priorities

The Detachment Priorities for 2019/2020 are:

- Road Safety Our objective is to enhance road safety. We will make efforts to increase our presence on our roadways and in our communities and we will ensure our members have the training they require to carry out their duties. Recently, one of our members completed the Intoxilizer course (Breathalizer). We now have five Intoxilizer operators working out of the Columbia Valley Detachment. Our two newest members will receive basic radar training in October and another two members will receive LASER radar training.
- Crime Reduction Our objective is to reduce Property Crime. We will continue to strategically target our prolific offenders. Last year our Detachment had 35 reported thefts from vehicles and 63 reports of theft under \$5,000. After the first half of the year, which is typically our busiest, we have had 19 thefts from vehicles and 24 reports of theft under \$5,000. We are on track to meet this objective.
- Youth Our objective is to prevent and reduce the incidence of crime involving youth. This fall we will be implementing a pilot project called Walk away, Ignore, Talk it out, Seek Help (WITS Program) in two local elementary schools. This training will address bullying in our schools. We will continue to work closely with our school district to identify other opportunities to support the youth in our community.
- Substance Abuse Our objective is to reduce substance abuse.

 Drug investigations take considerable time and money to conduct. I have committed to increasing training opportunities specific to drug investigations so our members will be better prepared to conduct these complex investigations. This summer our Detachment hosted two workshops related to drug investigations. Both were well received and our members have already begun to implement what they've learned. I have requested additional funding to host a Pipeline course in the new year which will develop our officer's observational, conversational and investigative skills in order to recognize indicators of traveling criminals. I have also been in communication with our neighbouring detachments to discuss how we can assist each other with our cross-jurisdictional criminals.

Guide to Requirements for Housing Needs Reports

and every five years thereafter. Effective April 16, 2019 provincial requirements require all local governments to complete housing needs reports for their communities by April 2022

Together, the housing needs reports legislation and regulations specify requirements for:

- Information Collection As a basis for determining current and projected housing needs, local governments are required to collect approximately 50 distinct kinds of data.
- Report Content All housing needs reports are required to contain certain content, based on analysis of the information collected, and a standardized summary form.

This guide is an overview of the requirements in each of these areas. I

The requirements related to housing needs reports are detailed in legislation and associated regulations:

- The Local Government Act (mainly Part 14) and Housing Needs Reports Regulation
- Vancouver Charter, Section 27 and Vancouver Housing Needs Reports Regulation.
